- 2. **Boston Stake Efforts** (FYI: Within our stake boundaries, the cities and towns with the highest refugee populations are Worcester, Waltham, and Boston.)
  - Stake Relief Society Humanitarian Service Coordinator: train and support ward coordinators and RS sisters. Service splits with missionaries are especially encouraged.

    - Collect soccer equipment donations for unaccompanied minor refugees for Stake Women's Conference, partnering with Ascentria Care Alliance in Worcester (www.Ascentria.org)
    - September service project before General Women's Meeting and other coordination with Young Women and Primary
  - Explore future stake-wide partnerships and projects

### 3. Ward Efforts

- Ward Relief Society humanitarian service coordinators and RS presidencies continue current local service and look for new opportunities for missionaries and RS sisters.
- Thanks to the previous hard work and inspiration of our members, Boston stake and ward Relief Society
  Humanitarian Service Coordinators already partner with dozens of local organizations to serve local
  refugees, coordinating efforts of missionaries (2-10 hours per week) and members who have time to
  serve. Partner organizations include the Charles River Public Internet Center (English classes), eleven food
  pantries and community kitchens, and local community organizations (tutoring, mentoring, home
  winterization for low-income families, playground building in low-income neighborhoods) (OVER)
- Coordinate service projects.
- Encourage service and visiting splits with missionaries.

- Support ward and stake efforts as prompted by the Spirit.
- Pray to know how best to serve in our communities.
- Prayerfully select and nourish one long-term, individual relationship with someone in need of refuge.

- 1. Abby House (Worcester one of the first emergency shelters for women with or without children in the US)
- 2. Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) North End/West End food pantry (Boston antipoverty agency, serving more than 95,000 low-income residents annually through its city-wide network of neighborhood-based organizations) food donation, assist with client pickup orders
- 3. Catholic Charities (Boston) assist clients in food pantry, serve meals, clean office
- 4. Centro Las Americas food pantry (Worcester) load and unload trucks, stock shelves
- 5. **Community Servings (Jamaica Plain** for those living with critical and chronic illnesses) serve food in the community center, deliver food to homebound clients
- 6. Cradles to Crayons (Brighton) sort donations for poor and homeless children
- 7. Greater Boston Food Bank (Boston) sort food for distribution to the hungry

- 10. **Prospect Hill Community Center (Waltham** an afterschool program for elementary and middle school children in a low-income housing neighborhood) help with homework, crafts, and games, help build a playground
- 11. Rosie's Place (Boston) serve lunch to women experiencing homelessness
- 12. Salvation Army (Framingham) serve at the food market
- 13. Sudbury Food Pantry (Sudbury) assist patrons in gathering food items from the pantry
- 14. Teaching/Tutoring English (Roslindale)
- 15. Waltham Family School (Waltham) potential ESL tutoring and mentoring
- 16. WATCH CDC (Waltham) "Barnraising" (winterizing low-income homes), teach ESL
- 17. **Wheat Community Services (Worcester)** help in the food pantry, move furniture, organize thrift store displays, and assist with the Community Café
